DAVID HOWARD:

Have you ever noticed how simple Biblical truths are often the most profound?

Bret recently asked me to review a new curriculum and I was reminded again of the importance of distinguishing between the past, present and future tenses of salvation as presented throughout God's Word. To understand the simple basics of the Scriptures as God intended them to be understood adds so much significance to life.

The apostle Paul expressed His concern for the Corinthians in the following verse: "But I am afraid that ...your minds will be led astray from the simplicity and purity of devotion to Christ" (2 Corinthians 11:3).

It is a joy to be a part of a group that understands the simple truth of walking by faith as the means of accomplishing anything of eternal significance.

The joyous conundrum of the spiritual life is that God designed walking by faith to produce works that accomplish His purposes. Works do require effort; however, that effort comes from actively depending on God and His resources. God and works that matter for eternity go together like air whistling over the wings of a bird. It is true that the bird is working hard to fly but only because the wind is creating the airfoil to provide lift.

Sometimes the simple things of life are the hardest to accomplish. Have you ever tried to work out consistently every day? It simple, but it's not easy!

DM2 offers a simple inductive and systematic approach to understanding and teaching God's Word. But don't mistake simple for easy! Communicating the simple truths of God's Word is a lot of hard work that can be accomplished only as God works through us. Only as we live by faith can we work in a way that pleases God (Hebrews 10:38).

The reason DM2 is effective is because of the many faithful people who put life's highest priority on understanding the truths of God's Word and teaching them to others. DM2 is committed to the hard work of sharing God's Word with others, but we know it is only by abiding in the Vine that anything of eternal significance can be accomplished (John 15:5). As J. B. Stoney so aptly put it, "It is a great thing to learn faith: that is, simple dependence upon God."

Bolivia, Paraguay, and Green Beans...

After nearly 500 km on my motorcycle, I was tired when I arrived at the church in Tembladeras for the pastors' meeting. But when I got there, there were no pastors. They had postponed the meeting by one day and had not been able to tell me. I phoned around and found out that Pastor Juan Iriarte was just down the road at his parents' farm, so that's where I went to spend the day and night until the meeting the next day.

When I arrived at the farm, everyone was down in the field picking green beans. I joined them and soon began to hear from Pastor Juan about their recent trip to Paraguay. He, Pastor Ismael, Pastor Angel, and a layman had been invited to Paraguay to teach Romans. They had taken the long bus ride down across the arid Chaco into Paraguay to the capital city of Asuncion. There they were met by Pastor Miguel and taken by car to their destination about a 1½-hour drive. Pastor Miguel was starting a new work, therefore the congregation was small and the accommodations a little rustic.

The teaching was scheduled to be from 7pm to 10pm every evening, so the first night they promptly got underway. By the second evening, word had gotten out that some evangelicals were in town and local thugs came and began shouting and throwing stones. The rocks made a lot of noise when they hit the tin roof. Since there were no walls on the new church, the teaching was stopped to pray for safety and to encourage the women in the group to get in the middle of the meetinghouse. Thankfully that was the only night the thugs

Pastor Miguel had invited the pastors from Bolivia because he wanted Bible truth taught, but there was a group in his church that was involved in Spiritism. On the third night, after the clear teaching of salvation through faith in Jesus Christ alone, the man leading this group came to the teachers and said he couldn't stand it any longer. He said that if what they were teaching was right, he was not saved. He told about how he had been living a miserable life. He hadn't been able to sleep much for the last six months. He said that in his bedroom at night he experienced weird phenomena claiming to see snakes crawling on the wall. That night he put his faith in Christ and the next night he testified to how well he had been able to sleep.

Also present in the teaching each night was a pastor from a large church in Asuncion. He was impressed by the teaching and began to beg the pastors from Bolivia to come to his church. He said he would invite many pastors and the group would be larger. Besides that, his church was big and it was airconditioned. But the pastors from Bolivia politely told him that God had brought them to this small church and that the reason they were teaching him was so that he could return and teach his own congregation along with the pastors from his city. He said he understood and would be back to hear the rest of the teaching when they returned.

The people of the town where the little church is located are very devoted to their religion and much of the local economy depends on the crafting and sale of images. The Bolivian pastors felt like God had directed them to this needy place to share the truth of His Word with these people. The

teaching was well received and many understood a clear Gospel for the first time in their lives.

By the time Pastor Juan finished his account of the trip, my back was aching but my heart was bursting. The four of us had picked 450 pounds of green beans in one day. As I lay down on the ground under my tarp that night, this was my prayer: 1. Thank you Lord for DM2 and the clear teaching of the Gospel that DM2 has brought to Bolivia. 2. Thank you for these pastors and many others who have been discipled and are in turn discipling others. 3. Lord, please strengthen Pastor Miguel and that small group of believers in that dark place in Paraguay. Thank you for praying for DM2 Bolivia.

This past Friday and Saturday we taught the Making Disciple Makers' curriculum, along with a couple of bonus topics from the Romans appendix: "Five People You Should Know," and "If You Live a Consistently Carnal Life, What Happens?" Eight teachers participated in the teaching. All did an excellent job. Everyone improved noticeably from previous times, and we learned from every single one. Included among the teachers was a political science professor from Colorado Christian University, a homicide detective, an amateur mountaineer of extraordinary alpine accomplishments, and a real estate assessor. All those who taught have an interest in making disciple makers.

We had a full house with over twenty-five attendees, including seven college students representing four universities. As a result of this curriculum, we expect at least one campus ministry and a women's Thursday night Bible study to begin soon. One of the young men who attended is looking forward to going on trips and getting involved in more teaching opportunities. He hopes to join us in British Columbia next month for the teaching of Romans 1-8. Another of the young men has an interest in South Asia.

Yesterday at our church picnic a young woman who grew up as a member of our church insisted that we bring a team to her church in Wyoming. We plan to set up dates for that this week. And we are hoping to get the Romans curriculum translated into Mandarin Chinese and open new doors in that vast and densely populated country.

As always, I find myself eager to see who will step up next with a desire to participate in the teaching side of disciple making. Please pray for more teachers, the necessary logistical support, and new venues to keep up the momentum. We trust God each step of the way as we grow in fulfillment

Lakeland Village Hospital, in the small town of Medical Lake, WA, brings together disabled patients, caring staff, and around thirty resident college volunteers. These students are housed for free across the street from the hospital in return for volunteer hours each week.
